




Most words are <u>not</u> from previous tests and it is <u>not</u> important for the students to know the words; they may even be nonsense words. The exam tests the children's knowledge of letter sounds, not their knowledge of the meanings of words.

#### Section A: Listening 40 marks

Part 1: Students will listen to the teacher **say** a 2 letter consonant blend which has either 'r' or 'l' in it. Students must circle the correct blend.

Example 1:	br	bl
Example 2:	fr	fl

Part 2: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word. They must decide if it has a short or long vowel sound and circle 'short' or 'long'.



Part 3: Students will listen the teacher **say** a 4 letter word and write in the missing vowel (a e i o u). To help the students, the 5 possible alternative words are printed next to the task so they can focus on the chant they learnt in class to come to the correct answer.

#### Section B: Reading 40 marks

Part 4: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word that has a long 'a' sound and circle the correct word.

Examples 1:	tay	tail	ale
Example 2:	may	nail	male

Part 5: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word, and then write 'c' or 'k' or 'ck' to complete the word. Words with 'c' or 'k' will be words from spelling tests this semester and words with 2 missing letters can only be 'ck' spelling !

- Example 2: m o <u>c</u> <u>k</u>
- Part 6: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word and must then circle the correct word. All words contain spellings the students learnt this semester.

Part 7: Students must know the sound for 'all' and the sound for 'alk".

They will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word and complete the word by writing 'all' or 'alk'.
