Mathematics

<u>Resources:</u>

Topics of importance:

Numbers of not more than 1,000: Textbook pages 1 - 12 and 45 - 58 Spelling of numbers and place locations (ones, tens, hundreds) up to three digit numbers. Addition and Subtraction of numbers not more than 1,000: pages 13 - 30 and 59 - 73 Using addition and subtraction for problem solving of numbers up to three digits with ones and tens place adding up to more than 10 for addition and borrowing from the tens or hundreds place for subtraction. Identifying the maths symbols and knowing how to spell them (+ plus, - minus, and = equals). Solving problems and being able to identify what answer is greater than, less than, or equal and using the correct sign >, <, =. Measuring Length: Textbook pages 31 - 44 Using a ruler to measure lines and draw lines using centimetres. Reading a height chart and comparing the height of individuals. Using addition and subtraction to solve problems relating to the height chart. Multiplication: Textbook pages 84 - 100 Times tables from 1 – 9 and problem solving by identifying groups of objects. Identifying multiplication word problems, the sign (x), and word times. Solving multiplication problems and knowing if the answers are greater than, less than, or equal and using the correct sign >, <, =. Time: Textbook pages 101 – 118. Looking at a clock and being able to identify what time is shown. Writing the time in words using o'clock, thirty, fifteen, and forty-five.

Mathematics Exam – Semester 1:

Section A: 20 marks

Section B: 50 Marks

In section B students have to give short answers to questions, or follow instructions and complete activities from the Units covered.

There will be two (2) listening activities which will include: 1) A number spelling test where the teacher will say five (5) numbers. The student will have to write the number in words (The numbers can be one, two, or three digit). 2) A measuring activity where the teacher will say five (5) measurements. The student will have to use a ruler to draw the correct length line and write the correct measurement.

Section C: 30 Marks

In section C, students are expected to demonstrate a good use of grammar and punctuation (full stops and capital letters). All questions in section C should be answered in full sentences.

Topics to revise for long answers:

Students will have to be familiar with reading word problems and identifying if the problem is an addition, subtraction, or multiplication problem. The student will have to be familiar with writing a number sentence, showing their work to solve the problem (using the horizontal or vertical method), and writing the answer in a full sentence.

Example: John eats four bananas for breakfast. He eats three more for lunch. How many bananas did John eat altogether?

N.S. 4 + 3 = ? 4 + 3 = 7

John ate 7 bananas altogether.

Long 'a' sound spelling ('ay,''ai' and'a+magic e')

Most words are <u>not</u> from previous tests and it is <u>not</u> important for the students to know the words; they may even be nonsense words. The exam tests the children's knowledge of letter sounds, not their knowledge of the meanings of words.

Section A: Listening 40 marks

Part 1: Students will listen to the teacher **say** a 2 letter consonant blend which has either 'r' or 'l' in it. Students must circle the correct blend.

Example 1: br bl Example 2: (fr) fl

Part 2: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word. They must decide if it has a short or long vowel sound and circle 'short' or 'long'.



Part 3: Students will listen the teacher **say** a 4 letter word and write in the missing vowel (a e i o u). To help the students, the 5 possible alternative words are printed next to the task so they can focus on the chant they learnt in class to come to the correct answer.

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Example 2: f l <u>a</u> p (flap flep flip flop flup)

Section B: Reading 40 marks

Part 4: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word that has a long 'a' sound and circle the correct word.

Examples 1:	tay	tail	ale
Example 2:	may	nail	male

Part 5: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word, and then write 'c' or 'k' or 'ck' to complete the word. Words with 'c' or 'k' will be words from spelling tests this semester and words with 2 missing letters can only be 'ck' spelling !

Example 1: <u>c</u> a v e

Example 2: m o <u>c</u> <u>k</u>

Part 6: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word and must then circle the correct word. All words contain spellings the students learnt this semester.

Example 1:	(rook)	rock	rake
Example 2:	hast	hish	hiss

Section C: Writing 20 marks

Part 7: Students must know the sound for 'all' and the sound for 'alk".

They will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word and complete the word by writing 'all' or 'alk'.

Example 1: s m <u>a []</u>

- Example 2: c h <u>a l k</u>
- Part 8: Students will listen to the teacher **sound out** a word that has a magic 'e' and write the word. *** Magic 'e' is the <u>last</u> letter but has no sound!
 - Example 1: <u>r a v e</u>
 - Example 2: <u>shine</u>
